THE internet site dedicated to Maybole has shown that it really is making the most of the world-wide web as long lost relatives are reunited.

The site www.maybole.org receives hundreds of thousands of visitors every month from all over the world. For one former Maybole resident a visit to the site led

"I was fortunate to find no fewer than three cousins and an uncle and aunt with whom the Scottish side had lost touch after my mother died.

"Through my new found cousin Harry I was able to take part by proxy in my uncle and aunt's Diamond Wedding celebration on June 10 2004 and in June this year my wife and I flew to Toronto and we were able to meet up with two of my cousins and my uncle and aunt for the first time."

Jack was full of praise for the Maybole website which brought him and his family members together after all those years.

He said: "Thanks again to all concerned with the running of the site, it is certainly one of the best town and area sites I have ever visited and must be a constant source of pleasure to all who log on to keep in touch with their heritage. Keep up the good work!"
