Woodlands project to boost local employment and skills

A WOODLANDS project between a Maybole training organisation and a local estate could boost social enterprise in the town.

A partnership with Cassillis Estate and May-Tag Ltd is being proposed to create a woodlands project to increase local employment and training opportunities.

Maybole Community Council's David Kiltie feels the scheme will benefit the town.

He said: "A project which brings new employment and training opportunities to the town and district is to to be encouraged and supported."

The Cassillis Estate has a large area of woodland where it is proposed to look at the feasibility of setting up a training and development initiative.

The scheme would look at woodland management and arboricultural skills; this could see benefits in terms of employment, skills development and biodiversity.

ty. Through the project, May-Tag will work with the community and provide training skills in woodland management, conservation, including dry stone dyking, hedge and wildlife conservation, and estate maintenance.

It is also planned that craft skills, such as making walking sticks, willow fencing and products, charcoal production and wood bowl turning will be taught.

May-Tag is also looking at the possibility of stone masonry training and Dry stone dyke skills, in conjunction with Cassillis Estate, Culzean Country Park and the Maybole Castle project.

The proposed partnership is with Cassillis Estate, May-Tag Ltd, Scottish

a Woodlands and the Forestry Commission. May-Tag has over 16 years of experience in the management of horticultural training, and community involvement.

The Cassillis estate factor said the trustees were pleased to be working in partnership with the community and May-Tag on these projects.

May-Tag are members of the Community Woodlands Association and the Community Recycling Network Scotland and is currently working with both to gain European and National funding for the Social Enterprise projects. Now, £25,000 has been secured from Communities Scotland toward a dedicated development team to move these innovative projects forward.

A Social Enterprise is a relatively new term for the type of business that May-Tag has been involved in for the last 16 years.

years. "A Social Enterprise is an organisation that trades in goods or services and links that trade to a social mission," explained Maybole Resource Centre's Peter Walker. "It is a not-for-profit organisation that uses its income and benefits to reinvest and create community and social benefits."

One of the benefits from the woodlands project will be a woodchip and log scheme which would work in conjunction with the Fuel Poverty scheme, the project would also provide logs for local disadvantaged people.

Maybole Castle's heating system is currently an oil fuelled boiler; by changing it to a modern wood fired boiler the woodland project will provide the fuel which brings environmental and economic benThe proposed community-composting scheme is a windrow system, which will compost green waste from

local business and the community. "All the Social Enterprise projects have the possibility of bringing new employment and training opportunities

MAYBOLE Men's Health Forum has been running for over three years now and exists to give all local men the opportunity to improve their health.


