Maybole New Community **Church Project**

MEMBERS of the Church of Scotland Trustees have recently visited and met with the New Church Project Team, our architect ARP Lorimers and Peter Walker, Funding Consultant. Our visitors were very impressed with the design of the new building and strongly encouraged us to submit the plans to them and South Ayrshire Council as soon as possible.

The whole meeting was very encouraging and they and Presbytery are enthusiastic to see this

innovative project complete. ARP Lorimers, Architects, have now applied for a demolition warrant. Once this has been granted work will begin to remove the old ware-house from our site. Then detailed drawings will be submitted to South Ayrshire Council for plan-ning consent, alongside plans for the youth cen-

tre. Several applications have been sent to possible funders.

The local committee and congregation have now raised $\pounds 18,000$. This was raised by the committee holding auctions, BBQs, coffee mornings and the charity shop.

There are also now the choir's CD, coasters and bookmarks for sale. These are available from Maybole Resource Centre. The book will soon be underway about the history of both Maybole Parish Church and the West Church.

There will also be the charity shop once again. There will now be meetings to discuss future fundraising events for the next year. If anyone has any ideas, please contact the committee who will be happy to hear about them. Once again well done and thank you for your

support! Lloyds TSB have accepted our application and

a meeting to assess the project has been held with Peter Walker, Funding Consultant, Bill Miller, Convener and ARP Lorimers to discuss the plans in more detail. More applications are currently being worked

on and will be sent to possible funders over the coming weeks.

So far we have raised a grand total of around £850,000. With the support of the congregation and continuing fundraising we should achieve the funds required to realise the exciting vision of a modern Church in the Community of Maybole.

HOLY Week and Easter services were well attended at Our Lady & St. Cuthbert's. The week began with Palm Sunday when the congregation, led by Fr. The highlight of the year, the Easter Vigil began on Holy Saturday at dusk, around 9.15pm. Everyone gathered in the hall and each person was given a candle, and then went outside to see the Paschal Candle being lit from the Easter fire. As the people went into the darkened church,

each candle was lit from the Paschal candle. The whole service was a mixture of darkness giving way to light, of death to new life. The church was decorated for the first time in

six weeks with beautifully arranged flowers in white and yellow colours. The cross which beforehand had been a sombre symbol draped in red, now stood bedecked with flowers and gold coloured vestments.

The music from the organ was joyful and At the end of the service, given that he had preached a homily, sung the Excultet and other parts of the Mass, it was surprising that Fr. Stephen still had a voice!

Easter Sunday morning saw record crowds with many children for whom the service had been specially arranged. The children participated in the ministries and the music - a notable addition to the music being drums which were ably and

rousingly played by a young parishioner. We were privileged to welcome Bishop John Cunningham who celebrated Mass with Fr. Stephen whom he formally installed as Parish Priest. Afterwards, the children were rewarded with goodies in the form of chocolate
