



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As part of the ongoing events for Year of Young People, around 50 young people from Maybole and villages throughout North Carrick got together in November to celebrate their achievements in their various youth clubs and youth groups.

The event was organised by South Ayrshire Council's Community Learning and Development Service and held in the Carrick Centre, whose training kitchen provided a tasty buffet for all the participants.

The young people enjoyed taking part in various workshops including cooking and

crafts as well as enjoying a fun roller disco before Councillor William Grant (South Ayrshire Council Portfolio Holder for Lifelong Learning) presented the young people with over 80 different, Hi 5, Dynamic Youth and Saltire awards for activities including Indoor Climbing, Skiing, Theatre & Drama and Volunteering.

The event was made possible through the Maybole and North Carrick Youth Forum being voted by the public to receive funding at the recent

Maybole and North Carrick Villages Locality Planning Group (LPG) held an information evening recently so that local residents could find out more about what community-based services operate in their local area.

It was the fourth and final information evening held by the LPG and invited groups included Social work, Maybole/Girvan

community care team, Carrick Centre, Circles Advocacy, Out and About Scheme, South Ayrshire life (VASA), Maybole Over Fifties, South Ayrshire Dementia Support Association, Carrick Seniors' Lunch Club, Community Mental Health Team. The Speakers, Carers Centre and Telecare.

Each organisation attending spoke about the service they provide and, after a buffet, members of the public were free to circulate round stalls which were set up with more in-depth information.















The most valuable part of the event for people included information packs from social work, the information provided by service providers, learning about all the different activities and clubs in the town and speaking with the presenters.

Those attending found the evening very friendly and informative and said that as well as gaining information, the people were friendly and pleasant.

There was a feeling that it was a shame not a lot of the public had turned up and perhaps it could have been better advertised to bring in more people. A spokesperson for the LPG said that leaflets had been distributed, posters put up, it was on Facebook and details were in a magazine delivered to most homes in North Carrick. This seems to be a recurring theme in many public events nowadays.

Maidens Primary School Fund receives funding

Maidens Primary School Fund received £2,825 from the North Carrick Community Benefit Company to provide picnic/activity bench sitting areas for Nursery through to Primary 7 children for use during school hours and for use by young people within the community out of school hours.

Provision of these resources would encourage development of positive social/educational relationships between children and adults through leisure and play activities.

Head Techer Bobby McPherson told us, "The activity benches are in place and are well used by the children at all times of the day. They are modern, easily maintained and the children make great use of them to sit, socialise and play a variety of table-top games such as snakes and ladders, chess, draughts, ludo, flick football, connect four and toy town.

"Particularly during school hours, the children and adults often sit and play and converse together which is building positive relationships.

"It is harder for us to monitor how well the tables are used out of school hours but the tables are openly

available for use. We are also addressing how we leave the games pieces out on the tables as in poorer weather we found bits and pieces for the games were blowing



away, so at the moment we don't leave these out after school hours until we find a good solution.

"We are now looking at having a chess club in school this year after the success of the tables and the Parent Council have now had some Family/Community game nights in school where we meet to socialise and play family games similar to those the tables provide."







Jenni provides support and information in South Ayrshire and the meeting was arranged as

part of a project carried out by Carrick Seniors' Lunch Club and funded by North Carrick Community Benefit Company.

This is in response to the growing numbers in the community who are developing dementia symptoms and to raise awareness of the need to support locally any form of isolation and disability.

The information Jenni provided was interesting and raised the awareness of the group enormously, many of whom signed up as Dementia Friends, a project run by Alzheimer Scotland to raise public awareness.

The meeting learned that there are different kinds of dementia but probably the best known are Alzheimer's and Vascular Dementia. Among early symptoms are loss of short term memory, poor communication skills, motor skills and sequencing. It is important—that people realise that dementia is not a natural part of ageing but caused by diseases of the brain. Nor is it just about losing one's memory; symptoms can be many and varied, affecting each person in different ways, especially as the illness progresses.

Dementia can also affect people's perception of reality. Given the right support, however, it is possible to live well with dementia, with proper awareness and understanding.

The Lunch Club hope that their project, which has a fuller report available if desired, will lead to voluntary action in North Carrick to support the already busy NHS and Care sectors of the local North Carrick Community.



Straiton

The PB event held in the McCandlish Hall in September was attended by a good number of the community. They delivered their priorities for the next five years and a plan is being prepared. Top of the list was new planters for the village to enhance the environs. These will be made available through the £3000 funding given to each community in North Carrick.

Lady Hunter Blair Walk bridge

Directors of North Carrick Community Benefit Company (NCCBC) were pleased to be able to offer grant funding of £5,000 to match monies from South Ayrshire Council's outdoor access fund.

Mark Fletcher, said that this is the second joint project where funding has been used to keep the walks around Straiton open to the public.



The first project was the Church Walk where the path had collapsed along the river edge and this time the Lady Hunter Blair walk bridge has been unusable making crossing the river dangerous.

The contractors, Jamieson Plant Hire, have now completed the works on the lower footbridge at Lady Hunter Blair Walk, Straiton. Unfortunately, as they removed the deck boards and parapets from the bridge, they discovered the timbers were in a far worse state than expected. This means they had to use new timber to replace a lot more of the structure, rather than re-using the existing sections of the bridge. They've basically rebuilt the entire bridge.

However, the bridge is now finished and back in use. So the local (and visiting) walkers are very happy!



One local resident told us, "This is one of the beautiful Straiton Walks and the one where folk often comment on the magical element there. It's the sort of place you expect to see fairies and has different aspects of loveliness according to the seasons. With the new bridge in place locals and visitors will again be able to enjoy this circular walk instead of just being able to use the top path."

The feasibility study for the new Community Shop was presented to the village by ARPL Architects on the 10th October. The meeting was well attended by the community with around 65 people.

The architects recommendation as to what the new shop should comprise and where it should be located were debated at length.

In a vote at the end of the meeting it was overwhelmingly agreed that the shop should be located to the east side of the playing field and the KVR committee should proceed on this basis. The Study was funded by a generous grant from NCCBC.



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NORTH CARRICK ACTION PLANS

Jura Consultants and icecream architecture are continuing to develop the Local Action Plans for your area. The consultation events with the local communities and schools are drawing to a close and the results that have been received are in the process of being analysed.

MATTERS

What has been great to see is young people are really engaged in thinking about their areas' needs not just from their own perspective but from the wider community's perspective too. Their ideas so far recognise the need for more employment opportunities, protecting the natural landscape and increasing health opportunities for all ages. The young people have been creating a set of actions they think would help improve their area - these actions will be refined and discussed by the schools in the event at the end of January to be included

Both consultancies will be working with the local Community Councils over the coming weeks and months. The results, as part of your new 5-year plans, will be published in March 2019. 

First Aid Training

Following on from a very successful First Aid training course, another one is planned for early in the new year.


The first of two first aid courses was held in September in the Carnegie Building in Maybole. The course was free of charge to community groups and focussed on emergency first aid in the workplace.

Mark Fletcher, chairman of the North Carrick Community Benefit Company who part-funded the courses through one of the participatory budgeting events held in the area, told us, "The event was well attended and everyone present gained one of the most important elements for first aid - the confidence to help in an emergency and the ability to stay calm and in control.

"Most of us never use the skills we learn and several people were having refreshers so if we need to call on the skills, they are fresh in your mind.

With the introduction of AED devices around the area, another project funded through the NCCBC, it was good that a large portion of the day was dedicated to CPR and the use of AED devices. Great lifesaving skills.

"There is a second event in February and I highly recommend signing up if you haven't already. The day flew by for those attending, was brilliantly delivered by St Andrews and was equally fun whilst covering a serious subject."



The full-day course will be delivered by St Andrews First Aid Training and held in the Carnegie Building, 1 High Street, Maybole - above the library - and there is a lift available for anyone who may have problems using the stairs.

To be eligible to attend the training, you must be an adult member of an active community group in Maybole or any of the North Carrick Villages.

Successful participants will gain key skills which will equip them to confidently administer emergency first aid and they will be awarded the nationally recognised "Emergency First Aid at Work" certificate which is valid for three years.

There are 15 places available on the course and applications will be accepted on a first come, first served basis.

> In order for this training to have the greatest impact, initially up to two places per organisation will be available and if there are places left further places could be available to groups if required.

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

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When celebrating Christmas was banned

How long does Christmas last - one day or twelve? Or is it every shopping day from the end of September? In fact the twelve-day feast of Christmas doesn't start till December 25th and it runs until Twelfth Night on January 5th. And yet it wasn't till 1958 that Christmas Day was officially recognised as a public holiday in Scotland. Even so, more than a decade later, there were still workplaces where December 25th was just another day in the office. Many older readers will recall when the winter close-down was only a day (or two) for Hogmanay and Ne'erday.

Scotland has had an on-off relationship with Christmas for centuries and Ayrshire was no exception. The county featured prominently in significant events that led to, and followed, the 1560 Reformation, which included the famous debate between Quintin Kennedy and John Knox in Maybole. Still the Old Faith lingered for another half a century until the last monks of the abbey of Crossraguel died - none of whom converted to the reformed religion. An Act of Parliament in 1581, against pilgrimage and other Catholic rites, set severe punishments, from heavy fines to the death penalty, for those caught practising them, including 'the singing of Caralles'.

Two years later dozens of people were accused of "attempting to restore popery" at Kirkoswald, Maybole and Paisley. Worse was to follow with the banning of celebrating Christ's Mass - a ruling that lasted so long it created a common, but inaccurate, belief - that Scots didn't celebrate Christmas. The English had their own turmoil. In the mid-17th century their parliament, not Oliver Cromwell, clamped down on the celebration of Christmas and other saints' and holy days - a prohibition which remained in force until the Restoration of the Monarchy in 1660.

But Charles II's betrayal of the Covenanters (as they saw it) brought about the notorious 'Killing Times' of persecution - not the right time to bring back the celebration of Christmas. That had to wait 300 years!

By the last quarter of the 18th century David Kennedy of Kirkmichael could enjoy a Christmas break at his English boarding school. (see below) But for his mother, Robina, and his Estate factor, Bailie Thomas Alexander, a neighbour of the weel-kent Bailie Niven, the 25th of December in Carrick would have been just another working day (see above) as it was for labourer William McMurtrie who was paid 1/8 (12 pence today) for one day's work cutting holly hedges at Kirkmichael in December, 1783. How times have changed!

It could also be a time for socialising as this quote from the treasurer's accounts, at the time the devout Queen Mary was in Stirling Castle, shows:

"Item, in the tyme of Yule, deliverit to my lord governour, to play at the cartis witht the quenis gracis in Striveling, ane hundreth crounis of the sunn."

The Scots word for Christmas is Yule, derived from the midwinter Nordic pagan festival of jól.

From the chair of North Carrick Community Benefit Company



North Carrick Community Benefit Company (NCCBC) is pleased to be delivering the fourth edition of what we think is a great newsletter that the whole of North Carrick can use to share information.

Please keep the stories - and news of what's happening in your area - coming in and think about letting us know what's going to happen in your communities next year.

At our meeting following the AGM, the board re-nominated the office bearers and all were happy to continue in post. Chris Savage was nominated for Vice chair, a position previously not filled; Chris was happy to accept the nomination and I welcome the support and experience that he will bring to the post.

At the AGM, the focus was very much on newly revised action plans and we are pleased to report that Jura Consultants and ice cream architecture are driving these forward for delivery to the community councils in the new year.

At the public consultation events that largely took place in October, the public were offered the opportunity to discuss their likes and dislikes about where they live and, further to this, the opportunity to discuss how to progress the changes talked about.

Included in those consultation events was the chance to vote in a participatory budgeting event and each



community council had been tasked with coming up with five or more small projects that could be delivered without the need for further funding as the £21,000 put up by NCCBC was match-funded by £9,000 from the Locality Planning Group. Keep your eyes peeled for delivery of these projects.

The response to these engagement events was better in some communities than others, but the quality of information gathered, and in the previous postal replies from earlier in the year, is very informative and when this is combined with the schools' input, the information will enable us to produce robust action plans that will help draw more funding.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to engage in this process and I would assure you it was time well spent as all views are valued.

Another key element that came out at the AGM, and is consistent with feedback at the consultation events, is the need for someone to work with communities to help deliver larger strategic projects.

With that in mind, NCCBC is actively seeking to appoint a development officer and applications for this post close on 7th December with a view to an early new year appointment.

On the next page we have a report from Mark Fletcher who is also the Chair of Maybole Community Council. We would welcome regular reports from the Chairs of other community councils.

From the chair of Maybole Community Council

Maybole Community Council and Bypass Committee are overloved to see that the enabling work for the bypass has started. The site at Smithston Bridge truly symbolises the start of something special - and long awaited.

The enabling work sets the line of the bypass with the removal of trees and hedges and the placement of temporary fences ahead of the main works. This work has to take place before birds start nesting in the spring and is a very normal stage in roads development.

South Ayrshire Council, in partnership with Maybole Community Council, submitted the second stage funding application for the wider town regeneration project and we are waiting on the result of that application. To say that the regeneration project, combined with the bypass, is a once in a lifetime opportunity for Maybole is possibly underselling the importance of the potential changes that Maybole can now embrace.

To remove all of the artic lorries from our town centre and at least 50% of cars gives us great opportunities to restore the fabulous architecture that we have. Maintenance on buildings has been hampered by traffic and the cost of road

closures to carry out even basic maintenance.

The opportunities to bring buildings back into some form of use, carry out essential repairs, widen footpaths and create a more pedestrian-friendly town centre that is still accessible to essential traffic will only prove to help businesses we have and potentially attract new business of all sorts.

The planning for this has been three years of consultation, professional engagement of landscape architects, surveyors, traffic management experts, building architects etc. etc. We would like to thank everyone that took time to get involved in the engagement process, the council officials for their support and expertise, our local elected members for their support and belief in us and the project. We now wait with baited breath for the outcome of the application and will, of course, let everyone know as soon as we do.
