

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NCCBC COMMUNITY PROJECTS FUNDING ROUND 4

NCCBC's Community Projects Funding has returned for another round in 2024, with each village encouraged to propose small projects for funding up to £6000 – where the village takes the lead on how they would like to utilise the funding and there is no need for match funding. Some village panels have decide to use their full award for a single important project, while others have invited groups to apply for a smaller amount. All of our communities have taken up the offer and we can wait to see some of the lovely ideas come to life. Read more below about how the communities have decided to use their funding thus far:

STRAITON The village groups and residents were encouraged to put forward suggestions as to how they would like to spend the £6,000 available to Straiton by NCCBC for 2024. Suggestions were collated and the following were submitted to NCCBC and were approved –

- New blackout blinds to be fitted to the new windows in the McCandlish Hall
- A new door and window frame for the Community Shop
- Plants for the village planters
- Dog poo bag dispensers and supply of bags to hopefully help with the issue of dog fouling in the village
- · Chain nets for the Public Toilets to keep out birds and flies
- Start-up materials for a new weekly Kid's Craft Group
- Admin costs for CPF Panel

We are very grateful to NCCBC for this grant and look forward to installing all the above. *Eleanor Kerr - Panel Lead*

KIRKMICHAEL The seven person KCPF panel met early in the new year, reviewed the situation and agreed as to how to proceed with the allocation of the £6000 granted to the village and its rural hinterland by NCCBC. The procedure was similar to earlier years and involved advertising the fund Via Facebook, a comprehensive leafletting exercise and approaching all known village groups clubs.

On the submission deadline seven submissions were received totalling £9055. The panel then met to assess the applications. In the discussions it was established that two of the submissions (Bridge Club and Defib) could be funded separately from other sources. In two other submissions (Christmas lights and fridge for Café kitchen) the applicants were advised to reconsider the products they were considering.

As a result of these discussions the applications were brought within the overall budget and the following sums were agreed:

- Bowling Club new mower for areas out with the green : $\pounds1900.00$
- Community Café New catering fridge: £700.00
- Community Shop New Signage: £395.00
- KKCG additional Christmas lights: £2520.00
- Toddlers play group additional play equipment: £285.00
- Advertising expenses printing and room hire: £111.00
- Contingency: £89.00

TOTAL: £6000.00

These proposals were submitted to NCCBC, happily approval was given, and the monies have now been released. The panel would like to express their thanks to all who were involved and helped in the exercise! *Kirkmichael Village CPF Panel*

KIRKOSWALD MAIDENS AND TUNBERRY This year

Kirkoswald, Maidens and Turnberry are working together once more to allocate their CPF Funding. Their panel met to discuss a whole host of great projects. After a lot of discussion, the panel decided to offer funding to the below projects, however the KMT Development Trust hope to pursue several other projects with funding from other sources, which is great news for the communities. They also identified a few projects which they plan to pursue via the council, so watch this space!

Overall the funding agreed from CPF was;

• World Oceans Day - benefiting a wide range of local residents and visitors of all ages, running over 3 days, with benefits to all 3 villages. This is the second year of World Oceans Day and will aim to build on the success of the 2023 event - \pounds 6,000

• Corrieston Path - while this is a project which benefits residents of Kirkoswald in the first instance completing a circular walking route, this could just be phase 1 of a multi-phase project to improve walking routes around the three villages, with the next phases looking at the Ash Pad connecting Kirkoswald to Maidens and Culzean. - £7,000

• Hall Hires for community groups - This project was funded in 2023 and received an incredible level of support and requests for support to be continued. - £5,000 *KMT CPF Panel*

DUNURE Dunure's Panel have decided to allocate their full £6000 to progress their exciting plans for developing the routes around the village. Dunure's award will pay for consultancy for the National Lottery Heritage Fund Stage 2 Development for their Kennedy Park plans! *Dunure CPF Panel*

The communities of Maybole, Minishant and Crosshill are very close to submitting their proposals for their CPF allocation, and we look forward to sharing their plans in the Autumn edition!

NCCBC MAIN FUND AWARDS

At the board meeting in May, NCCBC considered two applications, both of which were approved for funding. These projects were a new large screen TV for the Kirkmichael Stage and Screen Group who meet at the McCosh Hall in Kirkmichael. The second application came from Mochrum Angling Club for a specialist accessible fishing boat.

Thanks to funding via their Foundations for Recovery project, 12 E-Bikes are now available for visitors to North Carrick to boost sustainable tourism in the local area by enabling visitors to use E-Bikes rather than using other forms of transport to access local tourist sites and services.

The North Carrick E-Bikes are a fun and cheap way of visiting the many attractions in the North Carrick Area, such as Bruce's Web, Coastal and Forest Paths (including the National Cycle Network Route 7 passes through the region) and lovely villages such as Kirkmichael and Maidens, as well as the Culzean Castle.

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The Community Food Garden: A Growing Community!

Now that we are slowly edging our way into Summer (the sun is shining on Maybole for the fourth day in a row as I write this) we are seeing growth of every description in the Garden and signs of new life everywhere.

Our membership continues to grow, and we welcomed two new members to the group in recent months. A big hello to Rhona and Ailsa. We are always on the lookout for any contribution of time, skills, know-how or energy. So, if you want to be a part of "a growing community" (pun intended) please come along to one of our weekly gatherings or contact us on Facebook.

Our little helpers from Culzean and St. Cuthbert's Primary Schools are now starting to see the results of all their hard work in the garden since January. As well as growing and planting seedlings in the wider garden, they also now have their own dedicated planting areas that are becoming greener by the day. Groups from both schools attend the garden every Wednesday and learn not just about growing plants but also about the environment, nutrition and our local wildlife. By the end of the summer, they should be able to enjoy eating food prepared from ingredients they have helped grow in an environment that they have helped create.

The other main group working with us are Ayr Recovery, who have been spectacular in landscaping the area to the polytunnel's rear and building a dedicated cold-frame and plant nursery area. They have made excellent progress so far and we hope to make use of the area soon.

Gardening activities this Spring have been varied and include:

• Propagating and planting out a wide variety of fruits and vegetables including root crops (potatoes, carrots, etc.), salads (lettuce, spring onions, radishes), brassicas and legumes.

• Moving and enlarging the herb garden to allow a much wider selection of herbs to be grown, including various mints, parsley, coriander, sage, rosemary, thyme, marjoram and chamomile.

KIRKMICHAEL PRIMARY GOES DIGITAL!

Kirkmichael Primary have been working towards the Digital Schools Award this year, and have been learning all about digital technology. Here is a summary of what we have been doing!

Firstly, we were visited by PC McGinlay who shared how to stay safe online. This allowed us all to reflect on how we use technology to make sure we are all doing it responsibly. P3-7 took part in 'Be Internet Legends Day', and began to explore a range of topics such as phishing and cyber-bullying. During Internet Safety Day in February, we introduced Pupil Digital Ambassadors, and created a digital agreement for all pupils to follow when using technology within the school.

P5-7 have been developing their knowledge and awareness of different methods of Artificial Intelligence (AI). They have been looking at their effectiveness, and how they are used in real life contexts. They have experimented with the different software and evaluated the generated results, considering how these could impact their lives.

All pupils have enjoyed using a range of resources from the South Ayrshire Lending Library. They have had access to VR Headsets, Micro:Bits, Bluebots and Sphero Indi cars, and have enjoyed using these as part of learning across all areas, especially within maths and topic work. In May, we are looking forward to Digital Technology Week, where we will have access to technology like those listed above, and will have a focus on digital wellbeing. Stay tuned for progress towards our Digital Schools Award!

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ROBERT THE BRUCE TRAIL IN NORTH CARRICK COMES TO LIFE

An outdoor trail and app to commemorate the 750th anniversary of Robert the Bruce's birth at Turnberry, North Carrick is set to come to life in the summer of 2024!

The trail - which explores Bruce's web– allows trail goers to discover nine pieces of outdoor art using the Bruce's Web app with fun augmented reality elements and gaming challenges!

CRAG Community Arts SCIO were awarded the contract to deliver Bruce's Web, a project commissioned by North Carrick Community Benefit Company (NCCBC), with additional funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

Artist David Powell, renowned for his work in willow and steel, including popular sculptures at Culzean Country Park, Rozelle Park and Eglinton Park is leading the project.


The design process began with David and CRAG visiting six North Carrick primary schools to create designs for a piece of sculpture for their village inspired by the Outlaw King. The Team and pupils used drawing clay and wire work workshops to create their sculptural designs.

Thereafter community consultations were held in each of the eight villages; allowing local people to choose their favourite pieces of artwork, one that would guide the art piece that will be sited in their community.

It can now be revealed that the art pieces in each location will be as follows -

Turnberry – Sea Gate – The Birth Dunure – The Fish & Fire – The Feeding Kirkoswald – Droplets – The Baptism Maidens – Landing – The Landing Straiton – Axes – The Camp Crosshill – Whitebread Shorthorn Cow – The Grazing Kirkmichael – Spider - Ettercap Minishant – War Horse - Cogadh Maybole – Mercat Cross with Lion of Carrick

Each piece will vary in scale and materials and will be designed to complement and enhance the natural landscape in a sustainable way. Trail visitors will have fun seeking out the artwork sites!

As the ancient Capital of Carrick, Maybole is set to have a special centrepiece to Bruce's Web. Already under construction is a 'Lion of Carrick' sculpture from renowned Turnberry sculptor John McKenna. This refers to Robert the Bruce being the Earl of Carrick; a title that is automatically given to the heir to the British throne – currently Prince William.

North Carrick businesses are also



The Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere Partnership will be out and about in North Carrick right through summer and beyond. Already this month, the team has joined in celebrations for World Oceans Day, which was especially meaningful this year following the Biosphere's boundary expansion in 2023. The UNESCO region now includes 12 miles of the marine environment, up to and including Ailsa Craig!

Faith and Ribh, two of the officers working in the organisation's Community & Education programme, attended the Maidens World Ocean Day Festival, delivering 'Blue Biosphere' activities to pupils from local schools. Children were able to investigate some fascinating marine creatures, examine natural items from the beach, and learn about how we can stop plastic pollution in our seas. A calendar of school workshops is in place to introduce the Blue Biosphere teaching resource, designed to help primary-age children find out more about underwater life and ocean habitats, and hopefully to inspire a lifetime of coastal connections.

The Biosphere's Nature Recovery Officer, Antoine Lemaire, was one of the keynote speakers at WOD 2024. Antoine recently led the South Ayrshire Small-Scale Tree-Planting pilot, a partnership project funded by South Ayrshire Council. The GSA Biosphere Partnership advised and resourced a range of projects, awarding grants totalling £4,000. Planting of broadleaf trees will improve green spaces, providing new habitats for invertebrates and birds, shade for fish in our rivers and burns, and lovely areas for local residents to walk and explore. The next round of applications for tree-planting grants will open in August, and any individual or group with up to 0.25 hectares of publicly accessible land that could benefit from trees is warmly invited to express interest at any time. Why are we celebrating Robert the Bruce?

Our story begins in a small village on the west coast of Scotland called Turnberry. In this village stood Turnberry Castle, home to the Countess of Carrick, Marjorie.

Marjorie's first husband, Adam of Kilconquhar, died during the Eighth Crusade in 1271. Robert de Brus, 6th Lord of Annandale fought alongside Adam during the Crusade and was now tasked with delivering the tragic news to Marjorie.

Legend has it that upon seeing Robert de Brus and hearing of his news, Marjorie decided she would keep Robert captive until he agreed to marry her that same year. Robert and Marjorie went on to have eleven children.


On the 11th July 1274, as the sun shone across the Scottish countryside and the waves crashed against Turnberry Castle, Robert the Bruce was born. Robert was the the Bruce was born. Robert was the the third child of Robert de Brus and Marjorie, Countess of Carrick, but he was also their first born son.

Robert the Bruce led a very full and fascinating life in the 54 years before he died in 1329. Some parts of his life are well known like his victory at the Battle of Bannockburn, others not so well known like his love for eating eels, despite his physician warning him against it. Robert the Bruce's story is a long and spellbinding one, filled with victory and failures, love and death, courage and determination and even a strong willed little spider.

His life is definitely one to be explored and celebrated, that's why this year we will be celebrating the 750th anniversary of Robert the Bruce's birth, right here in North Carrick!



THE STORY OF ROBERT THE BRUCE

PART ONE

Robert the Bruce was born on 11 July 1274, at Turnberry Castle, to parents Robert De Brus and Marjorie, Countess of Carrick. Bruce's parents had an interesting first encounter. Legend has it Marjorie locked Bruce's father away and held him captive until he agreed to marry her, which he did in 1271.

It is well known that much of Bruce's childhood was spent at Turnberry Castle where he learned everything that he would require to one day become the King of Scots.

Bruce was an expert when it came to weapons and would often favour the battle-axe. Bruce was also a champion jouster and his skills in this craft brought him to the attention of Edward I, King of England.



After the death of Alexander III in 1286, Scotland was without a leader and with no heir, the future of Scotland was going to be complicated.

In the year 1291, a group of Scottish nobles decided to invite Edward I of England to a meeting where the future of Scotland would be discussed.

Edward was considered the authority figure outside Scottish jurisdiction whose guidance and input would be of great help. After all, Alexander III was Edward's brother-in-law.

While this plan was the correct step on paper, the Scots were unaware that after Alexander's death, Edward considered the relationship with Scotland to be over. Edward began to think of conquest and amassed a huge army at the Scottish border.

The Bruces expect Edward to suggest that Robert the Bruce would be selected as the next Scottish King. Bruce had impressed Edward with his military prowess and his jousting ability. While Edward was indeed impressed by the young Bruce, he was well aware that Bruce could not be kept in check. John Balliol was chosen as the next King of Scots and in 1292, the reign of John I begins.

In the same year, Edward I declared war on France. Scotland is ordered to amass troops to aid England in battle. Balliol refuses and signs a treaty with France. This enrages Edward and an army was sent to Scotland to deal with the insubordinate King, John I.

Meanwhile, Bruce decides that this dispute is between Balliol and Edward and chooses to assist the English forces.

This is the first of many misconceptions around the idea that Bruce was a traitor to Scotland. As the Bruce family held land in England, it was in their best interests to keep Edward happy. Otherwise, the lands would be lost and the Bruce family would have no chance at the Scottish throne.

Balliol however, decides that this is an act of treason and gives the Bruce's land to John Comyn.

Edward tells Bruce and his family to hold the English Castle of Carlisle against the Scots. John Comyn then leads an army against them. This is the first hostile act in the Scottish Wars of Independence.

Edward's army advances to Berwick and shows no mercy as Scotland is taken in just four months. Balliol is physically and publicly stripped of his coat of arms and goes down in history as 'Toom Tabard' (empty coat).

Robert the Bruce then becomes the Earl of Carrick in the same year and with this, the battle for Scotland and its independence began.

Your new community shop – **The Gatherings**

For many years, this building was known as 'Maybole Charity Shop' and was an essential resource for local groups to fundraise.

Gradually the building got into a state of disrepair with flood damage from the flat above. The building was at risk of collapse and had to close until an assessment was made.

NCCBC saw an opportunity and purchased the shop in 2021 with match funding from the NCCBC contribution (made possible by Scottish Power Renewables) via the Scottish Land Fund and the Regenerational Capital Grants Fund through the Scottish Government.

Thanks go to all subsequent funders and Maybole Regeneration Project who helped facilitate the refurbishment of the shop and flat making it safe to use again.

The former committee decided to stay in School Vennel and a new committee was formed to make the new shop run in complementary way.

The stunning décor in the shop was created by students of the Kings Foundation Building Arts programme, based at Dumfries House. Their designs, creations and attention to detail really must be seen to be believed!









From the handmade wallpaper frieze showing the Highstreet, to the thread work leading on the windows, the students have captured the essence of not only the town, but the shop itself.

The name 'The Gatherings' was chosen as a nod to the shop's former use as a haberdashery and because its new use will bring the community together in different ways. Recently, the icing on the cake was completed in the form of hand painted signage above the shop front.

The shop has been designed as a multi-use community space that can be used as not only a charity shop, but for exhibitions, live workshops and retail. This year, we have already seen the different ways the shop can be used.

A UWS student rented the shop for their university filming project, Maybole Over 50s hosted a craft week, Carrick History Society had the shop as an exhibition space, and most recently 1st Crosshill Guides and Rangers were the first to use the shop to sell second hand goods to fundraise!

Shop owners on the High Street told us how lovely it was to have a bit of buzz about the street again! The groups using the shop told us they loved their time in the space too, which is fantastic feedback to receive. Carrick Academy Time Capsule

It was the end of an era when the final part of the old Carrick Academy building was finally demolished. The commemorative stone from the old building was removed carefully (it is to be displayed in the grounds of the new building) and behind this was found a glass urn! A time capsule from 1925! The news was swiftly put on Facebook and the speculation began. What was inside? Jewels? Messages from 1920s School children? Or as one person suggested, ancient cans of Tennents Lager!

The real contents are possibly not as exciting as these suggestions, but they certainly are for a historian like me!

The time capsule was sent to the Ayrshire Archives where their expert team went to work trying to open it and preserve its contents. The lid of the vessel was very tightly fixed to the body and the team thought they might have to break it. Luckily with care and patience, the lid was prised off and the contents revealed!

Unfortunately, after almost 100 years, water had penetrated the seal, and the paper items were soaking wet. Again, the team at Ayrshire Archives used their care to lay these paper items out to dry so that they could be preserved. After some drying time, everything was placed in Mellanex pouches (these are special archival materials that preserve paper). On 25 April, South Ayrshire Council released a video showing the Time Capsule contents to the world.


Here's what was found -

• An envelope that contained coins in use in the 1920s including a One Penny, One Shilling and a One Florin piece! Written on the envelope was '22 June 1925 To those who find may keep. Present day coins of the

The three Kirk Sessions from Crosshill, Kirkoswald and Maybole Parish Churches met on Sunday 12th May at 2.00pm in the Carrick Centre to finalise the procedure for the forthcoming union. This should take place in mid/end June when they will become North Carrick Parish Church and a new Interim Moderator will be appointed by the Presbytery. People will still be able to worship in any of their local church buildings but there will be one Kirk Session for the new parish.

Beachcomber triple beach walk

Here's a gentle walk that takes in three beaches in our neck of the Carrick kingdom. It's about eight miles in length and can be shortened. It takes in Croy shore and both Maidens and Turnberry beaches:

Head for the free Turnberry car park at the junction of the A719 and the A77. Check times beforehand for the hourly 60 or 360 bus heading north. Go past The Culzean Castle main entrance and in 1.3 miles ask to be dropped at the gatehouse on the left on the top of Balchriston Road End. This quiet winding paved lane takes you downhill with great views to the sea and onto Croy Beach - also locally and mysteriously called Maybole shore.

Head left (south), past the twin Sagginwell cottages and eventually take the Ayrshire Coastal path ramp up past the Gas House monument exhibition to Culzean Castle. Here you have two options: either follow the curving Clifftop Walk to Maidens Beach or follow the coastal path arrows past the walled garden and then the swan pond and head straight down to the beach. Either way, once on the beach, head left (south) to Maidens village. There is a cafe at the harbour with public restrooms. Walk on the A719 past Harbour Road and continue southwards for about half a mile. Then turn right and follow the coastline path arrows to enter The Turnberry Lighthouse Road. In about 400 yards there is a faded coastal path sign pointing left. It is next to the 14th tee. This an agreed and safe path to bring you to Turnberry Beach with its sand, its curving shore and views of Ailsa Craig, Arran and the Kintyre peninsula. At the southern end of the strand, just before the burn, head left up a trail and you will arrive at the A719. Your car park is on the right.

The walk can be shortened by initially parking in Maidens and taking the hourly bus northwards from the village

Est distance: 8 miles

Route: gentle but with minor ups and downs Terrain: can be muddy after rain Sights: Culzean Castle, Maidens harbour, Turnberry Golf Course/Lighthouse Restrooms: Culzean visitor centre (go up the steps at Sagginwell cottages), Culzean swan pond, Ropes Cafe at Maidens Harbour and Turnberry Lighthouse. There are no facilities at Turnberry car park.

Growing Together KIRKMICHAEL – Cultivating Connections

The benefits of communal vegetable gardening extend far beyond the boundaries of the garden itself. Studies have shown that participating in community gardening can improve mental health, foster a sense of belonging, and promote physical activity – all crucial components of overall well-being in an increasingly fast-paced world.

A new group has been formed in Kirkmichael, with the idea of growing vegetables and herbs in raised beds that can be shared locally, it is also cultivating connections in the community.

Growing Together Kirkmichael developed from conversations about the potential to have a community allotment in the village, the polytunnel soon to be in place at Kirkmichael Primary School and bringing together the interests of some local residents in growing vegetables. The idea then grew to be a project to support the school with an initiative for the children and to support the community run shop and café with produce for soups and salads. Raised beds seemed to be a practical and user-friendly solution that would make gardening more accessible to all. With their elevated design, the beds would eliminate the need for bending and stooping, making them ideal for individuals with mobility issues and provide a contained environment that is easier to manage and maintain, allowing even novice gardeners to experience the joys of growing their own food.

A lawned area next to Kirkmichael Bowling Club was identified as an ideal location and the Club kindly agreed that the raised beds could be placed within their grounds. The Growing Together Kirkmichael group have in turn offered to assist the Bowling Club in maintaining the grounds around the raised beds.

To get the project 'off the ground', raised beds and soil to fill them was required. Morgan Sindall, the construction company at the new Carrick Campus were approached by the group to enquire if they

The Carrick Centre was delighted to cut the ribbon this week on our newest green venture – Veloboxes or more commonly described as EV-bike, covered, lockable shelters. The Veloboxes are fully enclosed, with motion sensitive lighting and fit up to 12 bikes. They offer a secure solution to short or long-term cycle parking and are an effective way to protect bikes



from tough weather conditions, vandalism and theft. There is also an optional space for a child's buggy attachment.

The Veloboxes are just the latest addition to the Carrick Centre's Green journey. As Board Chair Marguerite Hunter Blair explained, "Our Community Green Transport Hub was set up to tackle local service access issues, increase active travel and encourage tourism and visitor numbers to North Carrick. We have an ideal location near train and bus services with café and toilet facilities, and we have been working with South Ayrshire Community Transport (SACT) and other partners, funders and contractors to provide the required infrastructure. Fast charging points have been installed and there will soon be cars and minibuses for hire as well as e-bikes. Recent reports have highlighted the health conditions and concerns

that are much higher in this area than in many others in Scotland. We want to make our community a healthier more connected place to live and by helping to cut carbon emissions, improve air quality and encouraging an active lifestyle we are doing our part to improve outcomes for our community.
