CARRICK COMMUNITY FOOD GARDEN **LOOKS FORWARD TO ITS 5TH BIRTHDAY!**

After 4 years of good progress, in August 2025 the Carrick Community Food Garden will be celebrating its 5th birthday.

During 2024, along with local gardeners and farmers, the garden experienced challenges caused by high rainfall and below-average temperatures. But this did not hold back our magnificent team of volunteers and the groups we work with! Their efforts and resilience resulted in another successful year.

A total of 160 children, from Culzean Primary and St Cuthbert's Primary, worked with us through the year. Every week during term time 20 children visited us to experience each phase of growing vegetables, from planting out to harvesting. This was the first full year of working with schools. Following very positive feedback, we look forward to continuing this partnership next year.

A team from RecoveryAyr led by Chris Jones, completed a number of works from building a paved area behind the polytunnel to treating raised beds and fences.

Maybole's Art Group leader, Coral McMillan donated a garden table and two benches made from recycled wood by husband Hugh. Coral and Hugh painted them working with a 3rd year group from Carrick Academy.

As a reward for their efforts, volunteers and members of the teams we work with are encouraged to take away vegetables they have grown. We also held a number of pizza days on the garden using produce we have grown if available.

Despite the challenges, we grew enough vegetables to supply the Food Pantry at the Carrick Centre.

In October, the Scottish Smallholders Association held their Apple Day at the garden. This provided an opportunity for the wider community to visit the garden as well as to make delicious apple juice which will not be found on the supermarket shelves!

The garden looks for opportunities to participate in Maybole community events and had a stand at the Robert the Bruce event in July.

For 2025, apart from hoping for fine weather, we are considering how work schedules might be organised to suit school parents and other local folk thinking of volunteering. We may also establish partnerships with additional groups. In February, the committee and volunteers will be meeting to finalise plans for the coming year.

We have a team with a wide range of gardening expertise and experience combined with energy and enthusiasm. Nevertheless, the future of the garden will depend on more local folk volunteering. It's fun so, if you are interested, go to our Facebook page and send us a message!

Bruce 750 Celebrations

As we continue to commemorate the 750th anniversary of Bruce, the focus has now shifted towards the Arts and AR Trail, as well as the new Heritage Enterprise Village (HEV) project.

Heritage Enterprise Village (HEV) Project

The project to develop networks of local organisations, businesses, and attractions is well into its second year. Local historian, Simon Glendenning, was appointed as the Heritage Enterprise Village Coordinator until the end of March 2025 and there is funding for another year after that.

In addition, there's a promising opportunity for North Carrick to benefit from a community-led tourism initiative funded by ARIA and NCCBC. SCOTO's "Press Pause" programme is working



with communities that are keen to explore opportunities and issues around tourism. In some cases, the need is to explore how tourism could work better – due to recent or longer standing changes or tensions with visitors. In other cases, there are communities that feel there are visitors close by but they are being by-passed and not benefitting.

Press Pause, combined with the work being done in the HEV project, should help to maximise the benefits of tourism in North Carrick.

The Gatherings & Flat Above

Good news! In a project beset by external challenges, work on the flat is nearly finished and the new 3-bedroom flat will soon be available to let. The property has been finished to a high standard by a local builder and sub-contractors. It will be managed by an estate agent on behalf of NCCBC and should prove popular with prospective tenants.

NCCBC HQ - Community Asset Transfer

NCCBC has been leasing the former Golf Clubhouse from South Ayrshire Council from the time that the Golf Club closed down and the building became empty and there was a risk that it would fall into disrepair. A planning application for change of use was approved and NCCBC is now looking at securing the building for the long-term.

NCCBC is consulting local people on this and you can tell us what you think by scanning the QR code and answering the question in our survey.

NCCBC Impact Assessment

As NCCBC approaches its 10th anniversary of awarding grants, an impact assessment and a social return on investment study are being carried out. Community Enterprise Ltd and economist Richard Marsh are leading this work and a report will be included in a future issue of this Newsletter.

All this is to commemorate the 750th anniversary of King Robert the Bruce's Birth at Turnberry. Combined with the Bruce's Web App, this means that local people and visitors can follow the trail to discover the nine pieces of outdoor art with fun augmented reality elements and gaming challenges. 












As you make your way around each location, you'll find fun sculptures such as a giant spider and a war horse. Each piece of art has a unique QR code for trail-goers to scan using the Bruce's Trail app. That will create augmented reality imagery and bring the artworks to life. Through the free and family friendly app, people will learn about Bruce's historical links with each place. There is a fun "Quest for the (rown" game to play as well!

North Carrick is also home to many rural businesses including independent retailers, artists and makers, eateries, a range of accommodation providers and unique suppliers. Whilst out and about, app users are encouraged to visit the local businesses listed where they can scan posters to collect virtual badges, uncover selected discounts and pick up free brochures and stickers. The app also links to popular walking and cycling routes in the area.

Robert the Bruce was believed to have been born at Turnberry Castle and spent much of his life in the North Carrick area of South Ayrshire which includes the towns and villages of Turnberry, Maybole, Minishant, Dunure, Maidens, Kirkoswald, Crosshill, Kirkmichael and Straiton. The villages where the trail is located form a web like shape - hence "Bruce's Web Interactive Arts Trail". The creation of the Bruce's Web eight village sculptures and Bruce's Web mobile app was commissioned by North Carrick Community Benefit Company and awarded to CRAG Community Arts SCIO led by Girvan based artist David Powell.

Artist David Powell, renowned for his work in willow and steel, including popular sculptures at Culzean Country Park, Rozelle Park and Eglinton Park led the project with a project team including Ross Graham (Artoryx – app design), Jacqueline Ross (clever river – copywriting and business engagement) and Mary Jean Govan (CRAG Community Arts – community engagement). All the eight village pieces have been created by artist David Powell with David commissioning Morells Forge in Maidens to produce the 'Twa Aixes' and Jamiesons Welding in Girvan to fabricate the three corten steel forms.





kead Ertist David Powell told us:

"It has been a long journey, one full of twists and turns, but the pieces have now been positioned for the New Bruce's Web trail. From 'Ettercaps' tae 'Coos' the sculptures stand celebrating the birth of Bruce, Earl of Carrick and King of the Scots. Follow in the footsteps of Bruce and uncover and discover the rolling landscape of Carrick from shore and cliff to hill and forest... From The Landing at the Maidens to the 'Twa Aixes' at Straiton the eight new artworks are now sitting in their new homes. There has been a lot of firsts on this project which gave the CRAG Community Arts Project Team the chance to engage and work with local communities and talented local artist artisans and makers to produce the works which will from the new trail. With the artworks being crafted to last 25 years, the trail is set to be enjoyed by locals, visitors and tourists alike."

Maybole at the centre of Bruce's Web

At the heart of the trail is the ancient Capital of Carrick, Maybole - with a special centrepiece to Bruce's Web comprising of a Mercat Cross with a 'Lion of Carrick' sculpture on top. 'The Lion of Carrick' is a nickname given to Robert the Bruce. The piece has been created by Turnberry based artist John

McKenna, renowned for large-scale public art projects from intricate cast



















Artist John McKenna said: "I was thrilled when asked by Maybole Community Council and NCCBC to create a Mercat Cross and have enjoyed making it for them, producing the pillar and the historical plagues that adorn it. For the two decades that I have lived here in the Carrick area I have wanted to create a sculpture tribute to Robert the Bruce, who was born at Turnberry, the area I call home. The Mercat Cross, finished with my top finial of Robert the Bruce, Lion of Carrick, crowns the project for me and gives Maybole a unique centrepiece."

Mark Fletcher, Chair of NCCBC said of the project: "We are thrilled to see the completion of Bruce's Web which is the final element of the last 2 years' celebrations for one of Scotland's greatest Kings. We believe we are the first trail in Ayrshire to offer an augmented reality element that really brings to life the rich history of our area and shines a spotlight on Robert the Bruce through the combination of art and digital technology. Special thanks go to the young people of the area for their enthusiastic engagement and visions for the project. Connecting all the communities of North Carrick with this web of sculptures will not only appeal to locals but also visitors and keep people engaged with this wonderful place that we call home."



The Maybole piece was made possible by the Scottish Government, Maybole Community Council, May-Tag and North Carrick Community Benefit Company. Commissioned by Maybole Community Council, the piece boasts a pillar and commemorative plaques with the plaques telling the story of the town. The sculpture is designed to show the pride that the people of Maybole have in playing such an important part in the story of one of Scotland's greatest kings.

The Mercat Cross 'Lion of Carrick' unveiling on St Andrews Day 2024 declared the Bruce's Web trail officially open.

THE STORY OF ROBERT THE BRUCE

FINAL PART

On 25 March 1306, Robert the Bruce, Lord of Annandale, Earl of Carrick, is crowned Robert I at Scone Abbey. Bruce is crowned a hated man and had to work hard to win over his kinship.


Edward I orders the raising of the Dragon Banner. This is to signify that the English army are to give no quarter. The wrath of Edward I defeats the bulk of Bruce's army at Perth. By the end of 1306, Bruce and his forces are reduced to exile on the island of Rathlin off the coast of Ireland.

Edward I takes vengeance against Robert the Bruce by killing three of his brothers and taking his wife and daughter prisoner. It is beleved that while Bruce was in exile in a cave on Rathlin, he encountered a spider who inspired him to return.

In February of 1306, Bruce returns to mainland Scotland at Maidens beach in a final bid to reclaim Scotland.
Bruce's first action is to retake his home, Turnberry Castle and he succeeds.

May 1307 was the Battle of Loudon hill. The English forces catch up with Bruce but Bruce and his forces are victorious. Bruce used his knowledge of the land to force the English on a narrow front. Bruce used trenches filled with spikes to deal with the English cavalry. Caltrops were also used to force the English into narrow spaces. Caltrops were a particulary nasty triangular spike. Standing on one of these rusty spikes could well have been a death sentence. Infection or tetanus could be the nasty end to many and so these were avoided at all costs. Bruce's victory in this battle brought with it the support of the Scottish people.

Iln July 1307, Edward I decides to lead an army himself to Scotland to put an end to Bruce once and for all. Unfortunately, Edward I died outside the Scotttish border. Edward I was very ill and infirm at the time and yet his determination pushed him to make the journey with his army. On his deathbed, he tells his son and successor, that he wishes his body to be boiled and his bones put at the head of his army to conquer Scotland. Edward specified that he wanted his remains to be placed in a lead box rather than a tomb until the Scots are subdued. His remains are still in that lead box to this day...



During the next 6 years -

Edward II's Kingdom teeters on civil war and he finds it difficult to muster armies against Bruce. Bruce goes out of his way to avoid large battles. Bruce slowly takes back his Kingdom.

Bruce uses scorched earth tactics against the English, destroying castles including Turnberry to prevent the enemy taking them.

By 1313, Bruce hold every castle except for Stirling and Berwick. Stirling is his next target.

23 June 1314

The English amasses the largest assembled force ever seen in medieval Britain outnumbering the Scots 2:1. Before the battle, Bruce avoids being taken out by Henry De Boun. Bruce uses his axe to smash in De Bouns head and remarks 'That man broke my favourite axe!' The battle begins and the Scottish forces form a Schiltron forcing the English into the River. Archers fire upon the Scots but Bruce's cavalry wipe out the English archers quickly. A combination of marshy ground, heavy armour and cavalry unable to move force the English to retreat. Robert the Bruce has won the war and begins to rebuild his beloved country.

On 6 April 1320, the Declaration of Arbroath is signed which was a letter to the pope to force Edward II to acknowledge Bruce as King of Scots.

Bruce dies in 1329 in Cardross (today Renton) and Bruce's remains are buried in Dunfermline Abbey while his heart is buried in Melrose Abbey.

Bruce the Lionheart

I hope the events of the past 2 years and this 3 part story have helped you to understand why Bruce needs to be acknowledged more in Carrick. Bruce has been overshadowed by another Robert for years. Bruce's reputation has also been destroyed by the film Braveheart and hopefully, you now understand that his 'traitorous' actions were not as cut and dry as that film. North Carrick residents might already have heard about the Biosphere's recent big launches, some of which have been featured in national press. In October the organisation hosted the premiere of Heart of the Biosphere: A Year in the Life of Merrick-Kells & Silver Flowe, a unique cinematic short documenting twelve months of changing landscapes in the remote 'Core Areas' of southwest Scotland's UNESCO region. A crew from Lilac Howell Films worked with the Biosphere team to capture the fascinating wildlife of these wetland and upland areas in footage that followed slow-worms and toads through the bog, tracked birds of prey over the Galloway hills, and swam down rivers with otters and brown trout.

More than a hundred people attended the premiere of Heart of the Biosphere at Newton Stewart Cinema, and the film's first Ayrshire screening will take place on 11th January 2025 at the Carrick Centre in Maybole. Tickets are free to book on the Biosphere's Eventbrite page. The film is also available for organisations, schools, and special interest groups, with a Biosphere officer present to introduce the film and lead a discussion or workshop for attendees. Enquiries for this are welcome at any time via info@gsabiosphere.org.uk.

October was Wool Month 2024 and saw the launch of Merrick Scottish Blackface Knitwear, the GSAB Partnership's first social enterprise which has been supported by South Ayrshire Council's Community Wealth Building programme and a host of local and national partners including British Wool. Merrick's luxury knitted outerwear range is made using 100% Scottish Blackface wool sourced from farms in the UNESCO region; farmers are paid above market value for the fleece, and profits go back into local

grassroots projects. The online shop is now live at www.merrickscotland.com where you will also find some great articles about the sheep farming history and the inspiration behind the clothing designs.



In November Dolphin House, South Ayrshire Council's outdoor education centre, launched their new outdoor classroom and the GSA Biosphere team were there to help lead a full day of activities for primary and secondary pupils and adult groups, including beachcombing, rock pooling, and making bird feeders with SAC Rangers. Attendees also got to see a transparent kayak filled with seawater, a lobster, crabs, sea anemones and other creatures, a rare opportunity to observe marine life up close, and to go out on the St Ayles Skiff coastal rowing boat, allowing for beautiful views of Culzean Castle and the Carrick coast. The Biosphere's Community Officer, Faith Hillier, said, "The new outdoor classroom is a fantastic space for learning more about nature. wildlife and habitats and our staff are excited to be working in partnership with Dolphin House, supporting their important education programme within the UNESCO Biosphere."

Stories Etched in the Carrick Wind

The coastal stretch between Dunure and Maidens is riddled with myths that emerge from the soil, the hills, the Croy Shore and the farmlands that dip to the sea.

Take this example: above the Clyde is The Electric Brae with its peculiar name. Put the car in neutral pointing down a decline and, remarkably, it rolls backwards up the hill. Yes, upward. The Victorians mistakenly thought carriages and carts were pulled up by the mysteries of electricity, hence the name. Some bright spark finally proved it's an optical illusion caused by rolling contours. When you think you're going up, you're actually heading down the Brae.

The sea stretches under me as I roll slowly up (or is it down?) the hill. This old smuggling coast is littered with myth and fable. There's David Boran's Loup, a deep cleft splitting the rocky headland. It's reckoned our Davey louped (leapt in Old Scots) across the ravine to escape the excise man. Others say it wasn't The Excise that was after him. But his Ex-wife.

Then there's Katie Gray's Crags. Here, tucked into the most northern edge of Croy Beach past Isla Port, she supposedly lived peering over the silvery Clyde, to the ridges of Goat Fell, the Kintyre Peninsula, The Kyles of Bute, and the roll of distant West Highland hills. Archaeologists later found that Katie, if she ever existed, shared this little coastal outcrop with a Neolithic hamlet which actually did exist. It's about 4000 years old.

Now, nothing remains except humps, rocks and tough sea grass. Not a plaque, not a signpost, not a note on a map. The ancient site is lost to memory. Its only mark on the landscape is a grassy path that corkscrews up a headland, a brow of land, now that winter is entrenched, that's dotted with dying brambles, red Hawthorn berries, the spikey burrs of burdock and, also, miles of bracken dieback.

These tales are the jewelled bones of history. If

they're not specifically true, they still reflect the times in which they were born and enriched. How about

Hippie Woods just south of Dunure? It's not far really from Katie Gray's Crags and David Boran's fantastical leap. It seems a gathering of folks used to head to this copse of beech and ash near The Mill Burn each spring to celebrate Beltane. an age-old festival of fertility. They were kind to the land, cleaned up after whatever pursuits they

enacted after dancing around a roaring fire. Supposedly, a curious farmer approached during one year's nocturnal fertility rites. The festive folk asked if he wanted to join in. He courteously declined, as they say in the tabloid press, made his excuses and left them to their all night fertility revelries under the Carrick stars.

Farther south, above Maidens is Shanter Farm. That's where Douglas Graham used to live more than two centuries ago. Yes, the very man Robert Burns used as his tipsy model for Tam O' Shanter. It stands today, the farm does, between the harbour village and the glitz of Turnberry Hotel, no longer a working steading but a livery stables - but still a monument to the power of storytelling by Scotland's greatest poet.


FORMER GOLF CLUBHOUSE AT MAYBOLE GOLF COURSE

RECYCLE AYR

Recycle Ayr celebrates after receiving £14,400 of National Lottery funding to promote recycling, reuse & upcycling!



Local community group, Recycle Ayr, is today celebrating after being awarded over £14,000 in National Lottery funding to support its work promoting recycling, reuse & upcycling and as a result helping and supporting lots of individuals, families, community groups and charities.

The group, based in Ayr, will use the money to rent storage facilities and hire vehicles to collect and deliver donations. Recycle Ayr has been running since 2022 and is staffed by 12 volunteers. It was founded after seeing the success of a similar group nearby and how recycling could be not only be good for the environment but could offer help, support and funding to many individuals, groups and charities. The group now has collections once a month and then coordinates the passing on of the donations to local schools, craft groups and a variety of local and national charities.

In that year I've seen Facebook followers grow to almost 2000 and the collections going from strength to strength. Baltersan Castle: Rebuilding a Legacy for Scottish Heritage and the Arts

Baltersan, a 16th-century Scottish landmark, is set for a new chapter under the vision of Angelo Ovidi, the current Laird of Baltersan. This effort goes beyond preservation—it's an ambitious rebuilding project, transforming Baltersan from an historic ruin into a lively cultural centre for music, the arts, and community gatherings. However, the realisation of this vision hinges on substantial fundraising efforts and private investment, and activities will only commence once the necessary funds are secured. These aspirations, while inspiring, depend largely on external factors and the willingness of partners and supporters to join in rebuilding this piece of Scotland's past.

At the heart of this endeavour is a commercial initiative led by Angelo's company, Lichtsome Hoose Ltd., to support the project's financial foundation. Inspired by heritage brands like Duchy Originals, Baltersan-branded Scottish products are already in development, designed to foster sustainable revenue and engage supporters near and far. Alongside this, plans for private investment and community-driven partnerships aim to generate the resources necessary for the castle's physical transformation.


In the future, as funding goals are reached, Baltersan could serve as a vital cultural hub, creating new job opportunities and celebrating Scottish arts and heritage. A petition for a new coat of arms and the development of a tartan design, speaks to Baltersan's historical and cross-cultural significance, reflecting the Laird's Welsh and Italian connections and the castle's origins on St. David's Day, 1584. For now, this rebuilding is a vision grounded in aspiration, with the commercial arm already underway as a first step toward making the dream a reality.

A fascinating documentary film of James Brown's 30-year struggle to save Baltersan Castle from ruin was recently shown to a specially-invited audience in the 16th century part of Maybole Town Hall to mark the arrival of a new owner of Baltersan. The film was produced by Monika Deupala, a Nepali Masters degree student at the University of the West of Scotland, Ayr. It traced the six-year old James's introduction to castles at Ardossan in 1952 to his acquisition of the Category A-listed towerhouse of Baltersan in 1992. From there a series of interviews with key people in his mission to save Baltersan took Monika from Fairlie to Fife, from South Ayrshire Planning department in Ayr to Historic Environment Scotland in Edinburgh.

Monika's film has been widely praised for its sensitive handling of what could have been considered a sad account of long-term, exhausting struggle by James. Instead, in masterly, muted colours and artistic cinematography, a beautiful record has been created that will form an important and lasting part of Baltersan's archival record.
