


Royal Navy Stem - By Oliver and Lily

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With spring approaching the Galloway & Southern Ayrshire Biosphere will soon be revitalised with colour and

the wonderful soundscapes created by wildlife, rivers, and the busy workings of rural life. The UNESCO region's natural heritage and sense of place are key to its international status, and spring months are some of the best times to experience these.

March 3rd is World Wildlife Day, an annual United Nations awareness campaign celebrating wild animals and plants and what they give to people and planet. The UNESCO Biosphere includes

organisations including VASA and The Conservation Volunteers. Ayrshire's Green Health app has a directory of nature-based activities and volunteering opportunities from cycling to community gardening, and publishes a bi-annual calendar packed with ideas for what to see and do month-by-month. As part of their work with partners the Biosphere team have delivered Green Health workshops for Ayrshire College students, with community workshops now underway as well. Look out too for Blue Health activities - it's an ancient wellness tradition to head to the coast to recuperate and rejuvenate, and North Carrick is geographically perfectly placed to make the most of both colours! The Biosphere team tested the new South Ayrshire Snorkel Trail over winter, which the word "bracing" was inadequate to describe; a great adventure though, for a warm spring day.



outstanding habitats – many of which are exceptionally rare – and several of Scotland's most iconic species. Some are designated 'High Focus', those that the GSA Biosphere Partnership has identified as being under greatest threat, including black grouse, water vole and brown trout, blanket and raised bog.

Even if we may never encounter these particular species and sites in real life, the nature on our doorstep is where we can all play a part in conservation. The Biosphere team are encouraging everyone to take up nature recording using the iNaturalist mobile phone app. No prior knowledge is required; one photo is all it takes, and plants, insects, birds, trees – any organism can be recorded, plus scat, tracks, even molehills! Every photo uploaded helps create a picture of the UNESCO Biosphere's wildlife and habitats and helps spotlight where species are under pressure, or where they are thriving. This in turn focuses conservation projects in the areas they are needed most.

Spending time outdoors doing citizen science inspires greater understanding of environmental issues; it's also fantastic for physical wellbeing and mental health. The GSAB Partnership is a member of South Ayrshire's Green Health & Leisure (GHAL) partnership alongside NHS Ayrshire & Arran, South Ayrshire Ranger Service, and a range of local

For anyone unable to explore outdoors or disinclined to access the wilder parts of the UNESCO Biosphere, the GSAB Partnership has created a short documentary film introducing its ecologically precious Core Areas. Heart of the Biosphere:

A Year in the Life of Merrick-Kells & Silver Flowe was screened at the Carrick Centre in Maybole at the beginning of the year, and with over 150 free tickets claimed this proved to be one of the best-attended events in Biosphere history. Most recently the team have been invited by Ayr Film Society to show Heart of the Biosphere as part of their special event marking Earth Hour on 27th March, when it will screen alongside the feature-length rewilding documentary Why Not Scotland? at Ayr Town Hall.

Booking for this event is open now on Ayr Film Society's website, and Heart of the Biosphere is available on request for communities, schools and special interest groups to screen locally, at zero cost.

who was pleased to hear all about the progress the Project has made in the last 29 years.


It was a fantastic turnout, and we now look forward to planning a bigger celebration for our 30-year anniversary in 2026!

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Minishant Primary School Update

Class 1 have been using Literacy and ICT skills to write a recount of our 'Storm Day' on Microsoft Word. Pupils reflected on how they felt during the storm and shared their experiences with the class. Using Microsoft Word's tools, they experimented with changing font styles, sizes, and colours. Everyone enjoyed hearing each other's

stories.

Over the past month, we have been exploring tartan designs in our art lessons. We created unique tartan patterns using technology, different materials, and by painting on various colours of paper. Everyone is very proud of their creations and the progress they have made.

In Science, we have been investigating materials and their properties. Pupils went on a material hunt around the school, describing the textures, appearances, and uses of the materials they found. It was a fun experience!

Class 2 have also been learning about evaporation, including experiments to see how quickly substances like chocolate powder, coffee, and jelly evaporate. Additionally, we explored light refraction, making rainbows using water and CDs to split the light into a spectrum of

colours. Pupils then learned about how our eyes work and the different parts of the eye.

Minishant Social and Leisure Group secured funding through the NCCBC to run a 'Willow Project' with David Powell from CRAG Arts. David will work with all our pupils to plan, design, and create willow structures in the Minishant woodland walk. As well as

the Willow Project our pupils will be getting outdoors more to engage in outdoor learning so please look out for some photographs in future NCCBC editions of this Newsletter and come and say hello if you see us out and about.

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

Carrick History Society's First Conference

On 12 April 2025, Carrick History Society will be hosting their very first conference on the subject of Women's History in Carrick. Rather than being the usual kind of history conference, this one will not just include talks but playlets, displays and a hands-on workshop during lunch about 'Wummin's Work'.

Chair, Simon Glendenning, said: "I am delighted to say that I am responsible for the theme of our very first conference. It has always annoyed me that Women have historically not been recognised in the history books. There have been two women in particular who's stories are astonishing, and I get quite excited telling people about them! I've also had the opportunity to speak to relatives of one woman in particular who was well-known in Maybole in the 1960s. Who would that be I hear you ask? Well, you'll have to buy a ticket and find out for yourself!"

'Carrick's Women in History' is taking place at The Carrick Centre, Maybole on 12 April 2025 10am-4pm. Tickets are £25 each (lunch is included) and the full programme can be viewed on the Eventbrite listing by scanning the QR code or by searching 'Carrick History Society' on Eventbrite. NCCBC Annual General Meeting 2025

The AGM was held in Dunure's Kennedy Hall at the beginning of February. Company members gave a generally positive response to NCCBC's recent work and proposals for changes in future. This was despite one member's determination to criticise how the organisation is run and make personal attacks on the Chairperson and another member's attack on Scottish Power Renewables' handling of the damage caused by Storm Éowyn. The latter being particularly pointless since it is Scottish Power Energy Network and not Scottish Power Renewables that is responsible for repairing electricity supplies.

Presentations on the night included a brief summary of NCCBC's annual accounts with the full accounts having been sent out to members previously. There was also information on some recently completed NCCBC projects including the successful Arts and Augmented Reality Trail – new Bruce-themed art installations in Maybole and 8 villages, with accompanying app, and the Flat above the Gatherings on Maybole High Street, which is finally completed and ready for a tenant to move in. And the presentation highlighted some of the larger projects that NCCBC is aware will come forward for funding this year.

Scottish Power Renewables' Stakeholder & Community Manager spoke to the meeting and applauded the approach that NCCBC takes to its grant making. He confirmed that SPR is using NCCBC as an example to be followed by Community Benefit organisations in the UK and further afield.

2025 marks 10 years since NCCBC was formed. That being the case, the Directors had arranged to have a report done on the company's social and economic impact. That report will be available soon and the author highlighted some of the key findings.

The next stage is for Directors to take the finding of the Impact Report into account whilst it reviews NCCBC's funding policies and procedures. Any changes that come from that review will be publicised in due course.

A great start to the new year for Simon


We are delighted to share that Simon from Maybole is the first student to pass their practical driving test with support from our driving project!


Introducing BEAM (Building-Empowerment-Adventure-Mentorship)

WINTER WINDS, STORMY SANDS

From Beachcomber

The wind howls down the Kyles of Bute, over the Firth of Clyde and rams into the Carrick coast. It especially leaves its autograph on the Maidens sands.

The patterns change within metres, transforming from zigzag to what seems like twisted twine.

Sometimes the sculpted sands are footprints.

Other times, they're fish scales.

The tapestry is never the same. The so-called Hunger Wind from the north (named by fishermen because it stops the daily catch), changes direction, speed and intensity through the late winter days. Another blast and these patterns disappear. Gone with the wind, so to speak.


Above this battered beach, the Scots pines reach for

a sudden clearing sky. Trees stretch and turn for the light. It's not a silent wood. It's noisy. A real racket. There is no other sound like the fury of a storm as branches whistle overhead like loose halyards off a mast. The wind releases vigorous scents too-sharp ocean salt tangled with pungent pine.

On the other end of the beach, the roaring storm can pound ports such as in Maidens.









Straiton

January has passed, Candlemas Day has passed, and the days are lengthening.

"Spring stands at the gate with her finger on the latch." (Patience Strong)

Apologies to Peter Clapton who served with the Scots Guards, not the Scots Greys as was reported in the last newsletter. On Remembrance Sunday Peter lays a wreath for the Scots Guards and in memory of Lieutenant Colonel James Hunter Blair who served with the Scots Fusilier Guards, renamed the Scots Guards in 1877 by Queen Victoria herself. At his own expense James Hunter Blair chartered a boat to join the British Army at the time of the Crimean War. He was mortally wounded at the Battle of Inkerman in November 1854 and, such was his standing within the community that a monument was built to commemorate him - the monument which stands above Straiton and is a focal point of the area for walkers and photographers alike.

The Christmas Fayre took place in the hall in November with a good variety of stalls with lots of tempting wares. Members of the church and community provided the welcome teas which, as always, featured tasty sandwiches and delicious home-baking.



The guild welcomed Tanina Stubley from The Carrick Centre to the November meeting when she spoke about the many and varied activities which take place there.

Mochrum Angling Club were awarded a grant of £9821.60 as match funding so they could purchase an accessible boat. This boat will enable less able-bodied people the opportunity to continue or start fishing where they otherwise might not have had the opportunity without this boat. NCCBC is proud to have been a funder in this project and wish the users many happy hours fishing.



Pressing Pause in North Carrick – Exploring a community led approach to tourism

Many communities across Scotland feel tourism happens to them. They do not feel engaged in planning and promotion and some feel overwhelmed for reasons outwith their control whereas others feel they would like to attract more visitors but aren't included in marketing campaigns. Of note, many don't necessarily agree with how their community is being presented by others to the outside world.

SCOTO - the Scottish Community Tourism CIC – has devised a new workshop programme to help communities become much more engaged in tourism and in the driving seat of the planning, development and promotion of tourism in their area.

With generous funding support from ARIA, the Ayrshire Rural and Island Ambition Fund matched by the North Carrick Community Benefit Company, SCOTO spent four days at the beginning of February in and around North Carrick exploring the area and meeting with business and community representatives. SCOTO facilitated half day workshops that initially explored what is and isn't working in tourism in each community and what could be done differently or better.

Carron Tobin from SCOTO commented "Tourism is not what it used to be - we are definitely in a new era where more and more visitors are looking to slow down and meet local people, explore off the beaten track. In parallel, our communities are being empowered to own assets and have a voice and can be in the driving seat when it comes to tourism activity in their area. Press Pause is about exploring this at a community-bycommunity level."

The workshops helped the assembled locals to reflect on how competent their community is as a visitor destination - considering the current local accommodation offer, features and attractions, activities and experiences, and food and drink options. They also considered their digital presence, what assets they have within their control and how good they are at collaborating with others.

Place branding was next on the agenda helping each community see themselves as others see them – showcasing how the community is currently marketed by others and exploring how accurate and up to date it actually is. This is an important wake up call for communities to work with SCOTO to consider what has made their community what it is today, and what differentiates it from others. By really understanding local special qualities and sense of place it is then possible to look at what communities can offer to celebrate this, whether its events and festivals, new experiences, walks and trails.

Carron continued "these workshops exposed incredibly valuable insights about each community and North Carrick as a whole. I've known this area since my childhood and can see it is a fascinating mix of coastal villages and rural farming communities but the heritage significance is something that feels like it has got lost and now the communities can be at the heart of reinvigorating this and appealing to the types of visitors that will share that fascination."

"I am pulling the reports together and am very excited about what Press Pause has revealed and the clear opportunities for community led tourism to really take hold in North Carrick. Exciting times ahead."



A family from Brighton visiting Carrick to see their relatives contacted the Newsletter to share their experiences of Bruce's Web.

Six-year-old, Ivy gave the whole thing a big thumbs up! She enjoyed the Augmented Reality features in the App, especially the 'flying fishes' at Dunure, and she quickly got hooked into the App's game. The group visited the Bruce's Web sites at Kirkoswald, Turnberry, Maidens, Dunure, and Minishant. They felt that to do the Web justice and enjoy everything around each of the nine sculptures properly, would need two days.

Ivy's Mum, Daisy, said that highlighting nearby businesses and encouraging visitors to go to them to collect stickers was a good idea. She thought a good addition to the Web would be to have rubbing posts at each site so that children could collect images of the sculpture as well as stickers. She added that she couldn't find a way to take photos from within the App and

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suggested that adding that as a feature would be a good idea. Another improvement suggested by Ivy's uncle, Liam would be to pin the sites in Google Maps and make a list of the locations that can be shared and accessed by any visitor.

Awareness of the sculptures amongst businesses with sites on their doorstep needs to improve as does the availability of stickers at those businesses.

Callum, Ivy's Dad, summed up their visit, saying "The Web is a really good asset for the area. It encouraged us to visit places we would not have gone to, we learned quite a bit about local history and heritage, and at least one business directly benefited – the great little Café in Dunure where we had lunch."

KIRKMICHAEL FIREWORKS

Later in the year on the 5th November, Kirkmichael will host their traditional fireworks and bonfire night - something in the long term to look forward to. Good weather at this event is less likely but similarly perhaps less important.

STORM EOWYN

After a couple of days of dire red warnings all the mobile phones in the village shrieked, not interestingly enough, in unison but rather over a 5 minute staccato period texts appeared on screens warning of windy and dire hours to come.

They duly came, and once again the original settlers 800 year old decision to set up a community around the Dyrok burn was vindicated. Records indicate that the church was established sometime in the twelfth century, and it is probable that a community had

existed on this site well before then for it is really well sheltered from the prevailing South Westerly winds. Eowyn's fury passed overhead and destruction was limited to a few greenhouses and some relatively minor plant damage. The real damage however was outwith the village, as around midday, Patna road was plunged into darkness and remained in this state for some four days. Weirdly enough the

rest of the village remained unaffected and even more strangely, mobile phones refused to work in Patna road though worked perfectly well in the rest of the village. The Community came together and the candlelit shop remained open although unpowered and all its frozen goods were rapidly rehoused on a

temporary basis in other powered parts of the village. Those in Patna road recharged mobiles, torches phones, computers and the like from those not in Patna road and meals were happily provided by the haves to the have nots.

Scottish power came good at the end of day too, and offered hotel accommodation for those without power and a

daily couples allowance of £60 per day for food. By Monday, things returned to normal leaving behind a host of memories.

LIVING HISTORY

Thanks to a CPF NCCBC grant the History group has now commenced its recording project and g roups of active elderly residents are now meeting and are being recorded discussing their memories of Kirkmichael in days past. This has resulted in a lot of reminiscent laughter along with some unexpected blushes.

These recordings will be edited, and a short film will be produced and lodged with the history societies immediate archives. Given that the original interviews represent 'primary source material' they will also be archived in the long-term files. The Society hopes to be involved in an event to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the building of the McCosh Hall later in the year.

Carrick Resilience v Storm Eowyn

On 24th January 2025 Carrick Resilience faced its biggest challenge to date...... Storm Eowyn was blowing into town and looking for a fight. We knew she was coming, and we got ready to face the challenges head on. We fuelled up our pick-up and chainsaws, we charged our torches, we put on extra socks. We were ready!

As the storm blew in and started wreaking havoc across Carrick, reports soon came in that Carrick needed our help and we responded.

First job we attended was tree across the northbound lane on the A77 at the railway bridge just before Ayr, this tree was no match for our chainsaws. Soon after our next job was more challenging, a horse shelter had been blown out of a field and was blocking the road at Cargilston, (the crossroads). Fortunately, we borrowed a JCB digger from Jamieson Plant Hire and were able to push the shelter back into the field and re-open the road. Next job was a tree blocking the Electric Brae, again this was dispatched with ease thanks to our powerful chainsaws and it wasn't even 11 o'clock.

As the destruction continued across Carrick the jobs kept coming in, multiple trees were blown down on the Kirkmichael to Patna road, this road was kept open thanks to the efforts of our Resilience team member Alan Thom, who deployed his farm forklift to lift the fallen trees out the way.

Our biggest job of the day came in at 17:00 when we received reports of a fallen tree at Glenapp. We rallied the troops and headed down armed with our chainsaws. PPE and steely determination. What we found was not a fallen tree but a whole row of 20 trees which had been blown down and were blocking the northbound A77. With the police in attendance, we quickly set about the challenge and after a gruelling 4 hours of cutting and clearing we managed to clear





most of the road making it safe for use. Although tired and exhausted our work was not done, on the return journey we came across another fallen tree just south of

Ballantrae. Fortunately, this was just the one tree!

Next day we received word that Ballantrae was still without power, so we loaded up our pick-up with our generator and headed down to the community hub and set-up it up. Providing the residents of Ballantrae with power and the opportunity to get a hot drink and a warm meal.

Storm Eowyn blew across Carrick with a ferociousness that many of us had not seen before, but we stood resilient ready to face the challenges head-on. We would not have been able to do this without help from our incredible volunteers and our supporters and partner agencies. During the storm we liaised with Lesley Jeffery at Ayrshire Civil Contingencies Team. Thanks to Jamieson Plant Hire, Goosehill Farm, and of course Police Scotland, Scottish Ambulance Service and Scottish Fire and Rescue.

The award recognises Marguerite's tireless work to ensure every child's right to play with its huge benefits.


